MISCELLANY

Hope you all managed to hear the BBC Archive on 4 programme regarding 'Churchill's Secret Cabinet' and see the BBC4 'Churchill's First World War'. Both programmes, I felt, were well put together and very informative and enjoyable.

Interestingly I recently gave a talk about WSC and the first three years of WW2 and very few of the audience were aware of his time at the front during the Great War, still a lot of educating to do I think!

Something you may also find of interest is an up coming BBC 2 (I think) programme about the 'Wipers Times' the satirical newspaper produced by British troops during the Great War.

Written by Ian Hislop editor of Private Eye and cartoonist Nick Newman, it has a great cast including Michael Palin, Ben Chaplin, Julian Rhind-Tutt and Emilia Fox.

I am sure you all know that 'Wipers' was the soldiers' nickname for Ypres, the Belgian town that was the centre of three intense and bloody battles over the course of the war. I have a family connection as my Grandfather was killed during the second battle.

I also have a copy of the book of the best bits of the wipers times which is full of rather gallows humour reflecting the obvious hardship of the trenches, but with a smile - bit like 'Blackadder' Goes Forth'

Whilst on the Great War, I have been reading a fascinating little book (not much else to do stuck in the armchair!) entitled 'With Winston Churchill at the Front' by Capt. X. This happens to be Andrew Dewar Gibb a Scottish politician and barrister. I rather enjoyed this comment he wrote on hearing of WSC's appointment:

"Everybody liked the old CO and nobody could see why any prominent outsider should come in and usurp his place so easily. Why could not Churchill have gone to the Argylls if he must have a Scottish regiment! We should all have been greatly interested to see him in a kilt...."

However he goes on to confirm what we all know, that WSC became much respected by the soldiers of the 6th Battalion Royal Scots Fusiliers.
