Session 1	CHURCHILL: THE POWER OF WORDS 9:00 a.m. – 10:30 a.m. Mr. Allen Packwood The Director of the Churchill Archives Centre, will provide a glimpse into the personal archive of Sir Winston Churchill, highlighting some of the treasures shortly to be made available on-line and in the Morgan Library exhibition, and explaining why they are relevant to modern American history and how they might be used to bring the past alive.	Session 2	FINEST HOUR – CHURCHILL AND THE ONSET OF THE SECOND WORLD WAR: APPEASEMENT, THE FALL OF FRANCE & THE BATTLE OF BRITAIN 10:45 a.m. – 12:15 p.m. Dr. John Maurer Churchill's historical reputation today rests largely on his leadership from May 1940 – June 1941. Largely ignored in the 1930s, his mastery of what we call today "strategic communication and operations in the information domain" saved Britain.
Session 3	CHURCHILL: THE POWER OF WORDS 1:15 p.m. – 2:45 p.m. Dr. Manfred Weidhorn A literary analysis of Churchill speeches from three eras most apt to be included in American classrooms forms the basis for this session: his Munich speech (1938), two short speeches from the first days of his premiership in May 1940 and his "Iron Curtain" address (1946). Plus choice excerpts from a few of Professor Weidhorn's personal favorites!	Session 4	CHURCHILL IN YOUR CLASSROOM 3:00 p.m. – 3:45 p.m. Martha Curtis, Hunter College High School Arnie Mansdorf, H. S. of American Studies Terese Trebilcock, Hereford High School (Parkton, MD) Three seasoned teachers will share their thoughts and experiences on incorporating Winston Churchill into their classrooms. They participated for three weeks in a Churchill Centre NEH-funded institute in England and have developed lesson plans on Churchill.
ALLEN PACKWOOD is Director of the Churchill Archives Centre, Churchill College, Cambridge (UK), and is a professional archivist. He has worked for the Centre for 15 years and was instrumental in making it one of the most significant repositories for the preservation of modern political, diplomatic, military and scientific papers. One of the world's leading expert on Churchill documents, he is superintending the digitizing of the Churchill Archives, to be available in 2012.			
JOHN H. MAURER is the Chairman of the Strategy and Policy Department at the Naval War College. A graduate of Yale University, he holds a M.A.L.D. and Ph.D. in International Relations from the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy. Previously he was executive editor of <i>Orbis: A Journal of World Affairs</i> . He recently published a study about Winston Churchill's views on British foreign policy and strategy. He teaches an elective on Churchill at the Naval War College.			
MANFRED WEIDHORN is Professor of English Literature at Yeshiva University in New York and the dean of scholars on Churchill's literary heritage. His seminal work was <i>Sword and Pen: A Survey of the Writings of Winston Churchill</i> (1974). Born in Vienna, where his family was chased out by Hitler, he was raised in Brooklyn and educated at Columbia and Wisconsin Universities			
THE CHURCHILL ARCHIVES CENTRE			
The Churchill Archives Centre, situated within the grounds of Churchill College, itself the National and Commonwealth Memorial to Sir Winston, was purpose-built in 1973, thanks to the generosity of celebrated American citizens, to house Sir Winston Churchill's Papers - some 3000 boxes of letters and documents ranging from his first childhood letters, via his great war-time speeches, to the writings which earned him the Nobel Prize for Literature. The Churchill Papers served as the inspiration for a larger endeavour - a wide-ranging archive of the Churchill era and after, covering those fields of public life in which Sir Winston played a personal role or took a personal interest. Today it holds the papers of some 570 important figures and the number is still increasing. The Archives Centre added a new wing in 2002.
