# 1. Partnership for studies of the United Kingdom (UK) and Winston Churchill

The March 2024 program in London and Edinburgh marked the <u>150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the birth of</u> <u>Sir Winston Churchill</u>. It was the result of cooperation between George Washington University's (GWU) <u>Graduate School of Political Management (GSPM)</u>—the school of applied politics, legislative affairs, strategic public relations, and global advocacy—and the <u>National Churchill</u> <u>Leadership Center</u> (NCLC). GSPM is grateful to the <u>International Churchill Society</u> (ICS) and the NCLC for the \$20,000 sponsorship of student scholarships, select speaker honorariums, and other expenses in the program culminating the GSPM course titled *Strategy and Statecraft: Churchill and the Evolution of the Modern United Kingdom*. Please find the syllabus of the course in Attachment 1 of the Appendix.

To immerse students into the UK political dynamics, enhance their understanding of insider perspectives, and foster their professional networks, the four-day program in London included interactions with members of the UK parliament— <u>Robert Courts</u>, <u>Damian Collins</u>, and <u>Dame Siobhain McDonagh</u>; scholars and political strategists—<u>Malcolm Chalmers</u> and <u>Iain Carter</u>; museum curator <u>Katherine Carter</u>, and global consultants—<u>Miran Hassan</u> and his <u>Actum</u> company team.

In Edinburgh, we benefitted from a whole-day program at the Scottish Parliament arranged by <u>Steven Bell</u>, the parliament's International Relations Officer. As part of this program, we met with a Scottish parliamentarian, <u>Emma Harper</u>, a member of the Cross-Party Group on the USA, and <u>Iain McIver</u> and <u>Sarah McKay</u>, senior researchers of the Scottish Parliament Information Centre (SPICe). We also enjoyed observing several parliamentary sessions, including the <u>First Minister's Questions</u>. Our last day's program was hosted by the School of Social and Political Science of the University of Edinburgh. We were welcomed by <u>Dean John Devaney</u> and participated in the roundtable session titled *Scotland, the Union, and the World*, which was organized by <u>Professor Ben Rosamond</u> with four other faculty members serving as panelists. The final session under the theme *Churchill and Scotland: Perspectives of Communication Experts* allowed our interactions with long-term supporters of the GSPM programs and courses, <u>Alastair Stewart</u> and <u>Neil McLennan</u>.

We were also exposed to the UK history and culture through our visits to <u>Chartwell</u>, <u>Westminster</u> <u>Abbey</u>, and <u>Edinburgh Castle</u>.

Assembling such a diverse and intellectually strong program would not have been possible without Justin Reash, Executive Director of ICS and Program Director of NCLC, to whom we are extremely grateful. The agenda of the immersion program and the budget report are included in the Appendix as Attachments 2 and 3, respectively.

### 2. Assessments

Program participants included students from GSPM, the GW Milken Institute of Public Health, and the Columbia College of Arts and Sciences. Our meetings in London and Edinburgh have cultivated students' interest in and knowledge of Churchill's writings and policies as well as the implications of his life and career for the contemporary world. Learning from Churchill is imperative for the young generation's sense of history, broad-mindedness, and cultural and political sensitivity. These characteristics are critical for the development of national and world

citizenship, for assuming responsibility over domestic and global affairs, and for effectiveness and success in addressing the critical challenges of our time. Please see student bios in Attachment 4 of the Appendix.

The final assignment in the course, which students submitted after the UK residency program, was an essay on the legacy of Winston Churchill and today's UK. Below are <u>the quotes from</u> <u>several essays</u>:
